

## The Hereward Line

Travelling by rail in the heart of the Fens should be the first choice of transport in the area. Trips by train are often quicker, easier and cheaper than by car.

The Hereward line runs from the historic city of Peterborough to Ely with connections at either end to other destinations right across the rail network. Local stations across the district are well placed to serve the area at Manea, March and Whittlesea.

**A regular railway service with some great places to discover**

**Walkers and cyclists** can spend time discovering the charming countryside or enjoying the individual market town trails.

**Fishing** enthusiasts will love the many miles of waterways. The Fens have a reputation for some of the best angling conditions in the country.

**Bird watchers** can relax amongst the wild fowl and wetland wildlife in the Special Protection Areas of the Ouse and Nene Washes. With five nature reserves in the region there is no shortage of places to find peace and tranquillity.

**Horse riders** will find the good networks of bridleways and byways include trails along rivers and dykes providing a peaceful way to see the unique area.

An hourly service runs between Birmingham New Street and Stansted Airport. Two-hourly services run between Peterborough and Ipswich, there are a small number of Liverpool to Norwich trains.

## Hereward CRP for families



## Places to visit

Enjoy great days out along the Hereward Line



**Peterborough** - an historic cathedral city on the rail route to Yorkshire, the North and Scotland East Coast Mainline. Known as an "Environment City", there are some great places to explore in the surrounding countryside these include Ferry Meadows Country Park and the Nene Valley Railway.



**Whittlesey** - a market town bordered by the River Nene and Whittlesey Dyke. The town is also known for its brickyards. St Mary's Church dates back to the 15th century and the Buttercross in the centre of the market place dates back to 1860.



**March** - situated on the roman road 'The Fen Causeway'. The historic town includes St Wendreda's Church, the Grade II listed Ye Old Griffin Hotel and the memorial fountain commemorating the coronation of George V in 1911.



**Manea** - located close to the Ouse Washes, an internationally important wildlife site, and Stonea Camp, an Iron Age Hill Fort. This rural Fenland village is the home of St Nicholas Church, parts of which date back to 1791.



**Ely** - an historic city known for its stunning Cathedral, waterways, festivals and leisure activities. There are a variety of shops, markets, galleries and museums to explore.
