

Whittlesea Railway Station

A walking cycling route to Lattersey Nature Reserve
Total distance - 0.6 miles



1 Railway Station

This route starts at Whittlesea Railway Station where you can arrive by train from Cambridge, Peterborough or beyond. The station is not staffed but is well looked after by Greater Anglia, who are responsible for the site, and volunteer Station Adopters who keep the station clean and tidy and look after the array of planters on the platforms. It is also part the Hereward Community Rail Partnership who promote rail services, make small improvements to local stations and enable people to have their say about railways in their area.

To start the trail, head north along Station Road towards the Town Centre.

2 The Railway

Distance 90 yards

3 Marne Road

Next to The Railway is a righthand turn into Marne Road. Continue straight, along this road to the link path between 19 Marne Road and 21 Marne Road. This path leads to Hawthorne Drive. Head north here until you reach New Road.

Distance 450 yards

4 New Road

Turn right along New Road and head past the school on your left and the recycling centre on your right until you reach the entrance to Lattersey Nature Reserve.

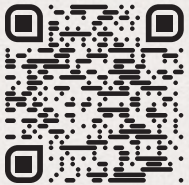
New Road is part of the National Cycle Network Route 63 between Peterborough and Wisbech, via Whittlesey and March.

Distance 600 yards

5 Lattersey Nature Reserve

This reserve is part of the Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs & Northants. It is located on both sides of New Road with a north entrance and south entrance. The northern section includes a lake, wooded area and meadow where twayblade and bee orchid can be found in the grassland. To the south you can explore a network of pathways and boardwalks through the wetlands. Here you may spot water voles, water shrews and an array of insects alongside rare beetles and moths.
